Heart Spirituality

The Sacred Heart the quintessence of the faith

The special object of each devotion to Our Lord is divine love considered under on aspect; but the object of devotion to the Sacred heart is the love of Christ-God seen as a whole in all its manifestations and in each one of them. "The Sacred Heart of Jesus is the quintessence of the Christian faith; the epitome and substantial summary of the whole of religion.

The Christian religion is a work of love in its beginning, development and end; the Christian religion whose history is found wholly and entirely in the sublime statement: "God so loved the world" (John 3:16); the Christina religion, finally, whose whole morality is contained in the single word, *Diliges*: You shall love; that is, you shall render love for love, you will give me your heart in exchange for all that mine has done for you; the Christian religion, we can say, could not be identified so completely with any other devotion as with devotion to the Sacred Heart" (Cardinal Pie)

Counting the Cost

In this striking passage, Jesus confronts the crowds with a startling challenge: "Whoever does not carry their cross and follow me cannot be my disciple." It's a demand that sounds almost unbearable—forsake family, possessions, even your own life. But Jesus is not asking for thoughtless abandonment; he is urging deep discernment.

He offers two vivid examples: a builder laying a foundation without the means to finish, and a king marching into battle without calculating his chances. Both are images of people who fail to take stock of what lies ahead—and suffer the consequences. For the builder, unfinished work becomes a source of public ridicule. In our time, such embarrassment may seem trivial, but in Jesus' world, governed by a strict honour-shame culture, being laughed at by neighbours could mean total social disgrace.

Jesus uses this cultural lens deliberately. He speaks into a world where honour is everything and shame is ruinous. And then he turns that world upside down. The true source of honour, he says, lies not in social status, not in family standing, not in worldly success—but in discipleship. But discipleship, too, comes at a cost.

This cost isn't measured in currency or time alone. It demands a total reorientation of our priorities. We must weigh what matters most, let go of what binds us too tightly, and walk in freedom behind Christ—even when the road leads through misunderstanding, hardship, or loss of reputation.

Jesus doesn't soften the call. He respects our freedom. He invites us to look ahead, to discern, and then, freely and knowingly, to follow. The choice is not made lightly. But the reward is life transformed—honour not as the world gives, but as God gives.
